UNM Graduate Programs Receive National Rankings

U.S. News & World Report released its <u>Best Graduate Schools rankings for 2015</u> and several UNM degree programs were among the top schools for their disciplines. Among those, the UNM School of Medicine's rural medicine program has continued to rank second since 1996, the UNM's College of Nursing's Midwifery Graduate Program ranked fifth, and our Nuclear Engineering program in the School of Engineering ranks 16th. These programs bring great recognition to graduate education at UNM, but more importantly demonstrate the exceptional educational experience offered to our graduate students to work with world-class faculty in these programs.

Student Athletes Continue to Finish Strong

Saturday was exciting for every proud Lobo fan as we watched the men's basketball team take the Mountain West Tournament title for the third consecutive year. March Madness continues with the Lobos playing Stanford in St. Louis on Friday. Our Lobo student-athletes continue to represent UNM well on the court, on the field, and on the ski slopes. Last weekend, freshman Eva Severrus won an individual national championship in the 2014 NCAA Nordic Freestyle race. Severrus' performance

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helped lead the Lobo ski team to a third place finish at the 2014 NCAA Ski Championships. Our men's and women's indoor track and field teams recently swept the Mountain West Conference titles under the guidance of head coach Joe Franklin, who was named Mountain Region Men's and Women's Coach of the Year. Alex Kirk, Kendall Williams and Cameron Bairstow were named to the All-Tournament team for the Mountain West Tournament, and Cameron, to the pride of thousands of Lobo fans in the "Pit West," was named the MVP. The president of San Diego State University said to me "UNM fans travel en masse!" We have had many athletic triumphs this year and I wish the best of luck to coach Craig Neal and his team in the NCAA Tournament. These many accomplishments bring to mind the value of athletics for our student-athletes and to our community. With thousands of Lobo fans in the "Pit West," and in every connecting airport between Albuquerque and Las Vegas, it is important to remember that sports unite us, and create pride in UNM. Sports remind us that success is about a state of mind. Michael Jordan said: "I've missed more than 9,000 shots in my career. I've lost almost 300 games. Twenty-six times, I've been trusted to take the game winning shot and missed. I've failed over and over and over again in my life. And that is why I succeed." So please cheer for our Lobos this week and remember that their success contributes to the confidence of our students who go on to become our next generation of leaders.
