## What we [Discover] Changes the World

Each month in my report at the Board of Regent's meeting, I try to share significant research accomplishments and objectives. I want to make sure these weekly messages also highlight what UNM contributes to the knowledge pool through study and innovation. A shared understanding of what we do helps all of us to better tell the UNM story.

Dr. Felisa Smith in the Department of Biology led a National Science Foundation funded collaborative research effort that showed the loss of the largest species on each continent over time is a <u>hallmark of human activity</u>, <u>both past and present</u>. This study, published recently in the prestigious journal Science, demonstrates the value and impact of our research mission.

From May 18-20, the inaugural <u>UNM Health Hackathon</u> will be held at the Domenici Center for Health Sciences Education. This is a truly interdisciplinary effort across several University departments to stimulate innovation in health care by promoting collaborations that could result in new research prototyping that could help in treating, curing or preventing diseases.
