There are a number of activities and events highlighting Black History Month at UNM, celebrating both the accomplishments and perseverance of those who have paved the way, and also those who continue to make history today.

UNM Day at the Legislature

Recognizing the exceptional work of our students and faculty is one of the many reasons UNM Day serves to show our citizens and legislators that UNM is the University for New Mexico, leading the state in education, innovation and research.

Remembering the Honorable Henry "Kiki" Saavedra

This morning, New Mexico lost a legendary statesman and true New Mexican, the Honorable State Representative and past Chairman of the House Appropriations and Finance Committee, Henry "Kiki" Saavedra. Although I never had the opportunity to meet Chairman Saavedra, his legacy is woven into the history of UNM and New Mexico. In his 38 years in the state legislature he was known for being inclusive,

decisive, quick with a joke, and most of all, for making a difference in so many people's lives. During his career at Albuquerque City Parks and Recreation, he ensured that young people had access to sport and recreational opportunities, and sought to instill leadership and community-building skills into those experiences. A star athlete himself, and honorary UNM letterman, he was a strong supporter of Lobo Athletics, and responsible for the funding of numerous major capital improvements at UNM, including the Tow Diehm Athletics Facility, Championship Golf Course and renovations to Johnson Arena. Chairman Saavedra was also recognized as a passionate advocate for the UNM Health Sciences Center, helping the HSC secure legislative funding for many programs including the BA/MD program, the Comprehensive Cancer Center, College of Nursing, Newborn Intensive Care Unit and Office of the Medical Investigator. Please join me in taking a moment to reflect on his impact and be inspired by his life of service.
