### **Faculty Petition for Unionization Progresses**

The process for determining the outcome of the <u>petition for faculty unionization</u> is well underway. The <u>University responded to the union Petition</u> on Monday, March 18. Before an election may be held, differing opinions about appropriate bargaining units must be resolved either by the Union and University themselves, or through a hearing before The University of New Mexico Labor Management Relations Board (the Board). Further, the Board must certify that the Union has presented a sufficient showing of interest in being represented by a union by proposed bargaining unit members. This week, an initial mediated meeting between the University and the Union will take place to determine if there are areas of agreement relating to the Petition and Response and which matters may require a hearing. The current process is standard and is set forth in detail in the <u>UNM Labor Management Relations Resolution</u> and in the <u>Rules and Regulations governing labor management relations at UNM</u>. I support all of our faculty and their choices as we <u>contemplate the various dimensions of unionization</u> and thoroughly examine the associated complex issues.

### **Provost Open Forums Began this Week**

Today we held the first of several public forums featuring candidates for the Provost and EVP for Academic Affairs. These forums are a chance for members of the campus and the wider community to better understand each candidate's vision and leadership style, while also sharing thoughts and ideas about what's working on our campus and what needs to change.
