In Recognition of Indigenous Peoples' Day

We join with many other municipalities and institutions of higher learning in commemorating today as Indigenous Peoples' Day, on which we honor our Native and indigenous students, faculty and staff. As officially recognized by the University, Indigenous Peoples' Day is meant to bring awareness to the struggles of Indigenous People; honor all they bring to UNM through their culture, language, arts, knowledge and values; and recognize the University campuses as being located on their ancestral land. With New Mexico being home to 24 Indian tribes, which represent about 10 percent of our state's overall population, today also recognizes the importance of diversity and UNM's dedication to equity and inclusion.

UNM Faculty to Vote on Unionization

In my time as President, it has been my privilege to meet and get to know many of our faculty and the ways in which their individual talents, accomplishments and contributions serve our students, the citizens of New Mexico and their scholarly and research communities. On Wednesday and Thursday of this week, our UNM faculty will vote yes or no on whether they believe union representation of their interests is necessary. The outcome of the election is determined by a majority of the votes cast as long as 40 percent of the eligible voters in that proposed bargaining unit actually vote. It is important that every member of the two proposed bargaining units be fully informed and participate in the process - I sincerely urge all eligible faculty to vote. Whether you do so and regardless of how you express your choice, you will be bound by the outcome of the election. This issue is critical to your professional experience at UNM, as well as that of the faculty who will succeed you. The UNM administration will respect the decision of our faculty, as we all continue to advance our mission and support our faculty, students and staff as the University for New Mexico.

2020 Census: Everyone Counts

The U.S. Constitution mandates that our nation count its population every 10 years. Next year, the 2020 Census will require counting an increasingly diverse and growing population – a snapshot of America – and it is imperative that we energize and educate people on the importance of being counted. Information gathered in the census is used to allocate federal funding for roads, hospitals and schools, as well as many

other programs New Mexicans depend on. Data from the Census Bureau shows about 43 percent of New Mexico's population live in "hard-to-count" areas and include demographics that are consistently overlooked, and one way to reach those populations is by generating interest and inclusion in the census. UNM's 2020 Census Complete Count Committee is launching its efforts this week, and I encourage students, faculty and staff to get involved. The kickoff event this Wednesday, October 16 from 12 – 12:45 p.m. in SUB Ballroom B, will offer information as well as volunteer and paid job opportunities. I look forward to having continued conversations on our campus on not only being counted, but also being counted on.
