Engineering New Solutions in Response to Pandemic

At UNM, we pride ourselves on approaching challenges with ingenuity and creativity. During this difficult time our research activities have enabled us to create opportunities and connect in new ways to advance our mission. Anticipating a scarcity of personal protective equipment, <u>UNM engineers, biologists and</u> <u>mathematicians have engaged with community partners to study, design, and produce effective face masks, and assess ways to safely disinfect them for reuse</u>. Our students and faculty are drawing on their expertise, UNM research facilities, and both public and private partnerships to provide much needed solutions in the battle against the COVID-19.

Prestigious Guggenheim Fellowship Awarded to Fine Arts Faculty

Guggenheim Fellowships are one of the nation's most prestigious academic honors, awarded to those individuals who have already demonstrated exceptional capacity for productive scholarship or exceptional creative ability in the arts. The Foundation received nearly 3,000 applications this year, and awarded 175 Fellowships to a diverse group of artists, scholars and writers. I am delighted that <u>Dr. José-Luis Hurtado</u>, <u>Associate Professor of Music Theory and Composition</u>, is among the 2020 recipients. This high honor is well-deserved, and Dr. Hurtado's distinctive work is a vivid reflection of the UNM College of Fine Arts' mission to engage in creative and inspirational art and music.

Campus Climate Events Encourage Understanding and Kindness During Covid-19

While we may be physically distanced during these uncertain times, UNM is still strongly dedicated to ensuring that our campus continues to uphold its values of equity and inclusion. Not only must we be vigilant in rejecting bias in our community – physical or virtual – but we also must support those of us who may be experiencing anxiety and concern for their family and loved ones, as well as for themselves. The Division of Equity and Inclusion has planned events to address issues of racism and xenophobia towards certain groups – including microaggressions, discrimination, avoidance, harassment, threats and physical assaults. Panels will discuss how valuing inclusivity means remembering that we all have different circumstances, and the importance of treating everyone with respect, both in their presence and in their absence. The first panel, which was held last week, <u>addressed the impact on students and included a focus</u> on resources such as our ethnic and support centers. This Friday, April 17, the <u>climate panel will focus on the impact on faculty and staff</u>. A third event is being planned with the Asian American Student Association and other affected student groups during which we will hear their concerns and brainstorms ways to address issues they are facing. Together, we will find strength through understanding, patience and kindness.

UNM Teaching Mission Persists Abroad

As we navigate the move to a virtual environment this spring, the perspectives of the people who make up the Lobo community are a big part of what enhances our shared experience. For Associate Professor David Weiss of the UNM Department of Communication & Journalism, <u>his sabbatical in Prague</u> has "allowed him to find the beauty in the midst of a dark pandemic." Having been in the Czech Republic since February, he has moved his classes on strategic planning and political communication at Charles University in Prague online, facing the challenges of condensing curriculum and keeping students engaged – just like many of his colleagues here. I hope Lobos will continue to share their stories with us and with each other, keeping us connected in as many ways as possible.
