Good afternoon.

With cases of coronavirus on the upswing in New Mexico, Governor Lujan Grisham recently announced she has put the reopening of New Mexico's economy on hold while she and state health officials monitor transmission rates. The current restrictions on businesses—such as limited capacities and use of masks—were initially expected to change on July 1, though at the moment, it's unclear when restrictions will be loosened, tightened, or lifted entirely.

What does this mean for The University of New Mexico? Every day, we are vigilantly examining the latest health information provided by federal, state, and local officials, and we continue to monitor trends regarding both transmission and outbreaks—especially in counties where UNM has facilities. We will be carefully considering the impact of these trends on our Fall operations, and it will be more critical than ever that we continue to adhere to health and safety protocols on campus, including social distancing and the wearing of masks.

UNM and its Health Sciences Center are continuing to "Bring Back the Pack" responsibly by following our comprehensive plan to move our campus back to fully operational status. However, please keep in mind that while UNM is continuing to implement this blueprint for reopening slowly and safely, we are also planning for a continuum of scenarios, with the utmost of deference to public health and safety. We will, of course, comply with any additional federal, state, and local guidance required beyond our already strenuous restrictions.

As we approach July 1, here's what you need to know:

- Summer courses, which began on June 1, are being conducted remotely, while <u>some laboratory and</u> research facilities continue to ramp up their activities.
- Facilities Management has established a request process to re-open individual departments, designed
  to organize and prioritize the areas that can move towards an increased on-campus presence. Once a
  department's Return to Operations plan has been approved by the appropriate dean/director, the next step
  towards increasing specific department's on-campus presence will be to submit a formal Facility Re-open
  Request on the Facility Re-open Request website.
- UNM's Main and Branch campuses are continuing with a <u>daily e-mail screening policy for all employees</u>.

  Employees will receive a daily e-mail inquiring whether they will be working on campus--and if so, checking to see if employees are showing any symptoms of illness.
- To the extent possible, please continue to work remotely. Some faculty and staff will need to return to campus to carry out their functions; please do so in a safe and responsible manner, following worksite protocols.
- The Main Campus and Medical/Legal Bookstores are both open, though with <u>limited hours and public</u> <u>health/safety restrictions in place</u>.
- Residence Life and Student Housing has issued guidance for the Fall 2020 semester.

- Parking enforcement has resumed its normal summer schedule.
- Lobo Athletics has issued <u>guidance for the Lobo football home opener</u> at Dreamstyle Stadium on August 29.
- The Fall 2020 instructional schedule maintains the same start and end dates for the term, and the same number of instructional days as required by our regional accreditor, but will spread the two fall break days out over early October and early November, including making election day a non-instructional day. We will also end in-person instruction just before Thanksgiving. Finals will take place from December 7 through December 12.
- Social distancing and the use of masks continue to be required whenever individuals are working or spending any time around others.
- To help slow the spread of infection, we are continuing with our <u>policy of self-reporting</u> either symptoms of or a positive test for COVID-19.
- We're also constantly updating our <u>Frequently Asked Questions</u> as new questions arrive.

We'll be paying close attention to the Governor's guidance this week, and should the state require additional restrictions, we'll adjust our plan to <u>Bring Back the Pack</u> accordingly. We will keep you posted.
