Good afternoon, Lobos -

Next Monday marks the beginning of Black History Month—and as we look at the remarkable events that have occurred in our country over the last year, we recognize that Black history isn't just something that happened 450, or 150, or 50 years ago; it's still happening right now. From protests across the nation in the name of racial justice, to the swearing in of the first woman of color as our nation's vice president, the past 12 months alone reaffirm that Black history is American history.

While <u>Black History Month</u> was formally designated by President Ford 45 years ago, UNM has celebrated Black history, and Black lives, for more than 50 years. In 1970, following the lead of our students, faculty, and staff, Afro Studies, the first ethnic studies research program at The University of New Mexico and one of the oldest in the country was established. Today, it's our degree-granting, Africana Studies program, and I'm proud that 2021 marks the beginning of its sixth remarkable decade of facilitating academic freedom of Black faculty and building Africana, African Diaspora, and African American Studies as viable and vibrant academic disciplines.

Black History Month is a regular and much-needed reminder that our history as a nation is multi-cultural, that the Black experience is the American experience, and that there is unity to be found in our plurality. That unity is worth striving for—but it also takes work. As James Baldwin wrote: "The paradox of education is precisely this—that as one begins to become conscious one begins to examine the society in which he is being educated."

I encourage us all to aspire to meet Baldwin's challenge—not just during Black History Month, but every day. Never stop exploring. Never stop learning. And never, ever stop examining the society around us.
