Across our campuses, 92 percent of students, 98 percent of faculty, and 97 percent of staff are either fully or partially vaccinated or have obtained an approved exemption and are abiding by the regular COVID testing. Your care and commitment to the health and safety of our pack makes it possible for us to continue to safely provide face-to-face instruction, enjoy each other's company, and celebrate events in person. I truly appreciate your doing your part.

I am also thankful to our vaccine verification team, who checked and double-checked the documentation submitted through our website and answered the countless questions that arrived by e-mail daily. I am also grateful to our team at HSC for providing a free and convenient COVID vaccination clinic on campus—it was terrific to see so many of you lined up in the SUB for your shot—and for helping us ensure our policies and practices were rooted in the best available science.

As always, we'll continue to monitor state, local, and national trends for COVID and will continue to make the safety of our campus and community our top priority. Our <u>UNM COVID dashboard</u> is updated regularly to reflect our vaccination rates as well as any reported cases on campus—a number, I'm relieved to say, that has remained low—and we're continuing to work to make sure 100 percent of the Lobo community has reported their vaccination status.

Thanks to all of you, our pack is truly back. And I'm looking forward to completing a successful and healthy Fall semester together.

New Student Enrollment Numbers Trend Upwards

Even as colleges and universities across the nation continue to see declining enrollments of new students in the face of COVID-related challenges, <u>first-year student enrollment at The University of New Mexico increased by 10 percent for Fall 2021</u>, <u>while new graduate student enrollment is up 19 percent</u>. Just as encouraging, enrollment of new Native, Hispanic, and African American first-year students also continued to increase—a promising trend that reflects the diverse culture and history of our university and our state. As we emerge from a global pandemic, I truly appreciate the fantastic work our faculty and staff have done to

ensure our Lobo students continue to have access to a great education and the tools they need to succeed in the classroom and beyond, even as we acknowledge we have some work ahead of us to encourage our students who chose not to return this fall to get back on the path to their degrees.

PAIS Achieves LEED Gold Certification

I was thrilled to learn that our state-of-the-art Physics & Astronomy and Interdisciplinary Science (PAIS) building was recently awarded a prestigious <u>Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) Gold certification by the U.S. Green Building Council</u>. The internationally recognized <u>LEED credential</u> denotes proficiency in sustainable design, construction and operations standards, and indicates that a building is more energy and resource-efficient--and is, therefore, less stressful on the environment. If you've seen our PAIS building, you already know it's extraordinary; I'm pleased to see it honored with this distinguished recognition, which exceeds the state-required LEED Silver standard for new construction. PAIS is one of nearly 30 UNM facilities with a LEED certification and is <u>among our 18 buildings with a LEED Gold certification or higher</u>.

UNM Charts Across Several Hispanic Outlook on Education Rankings

Hispanic Outlook on Education Magazine recently named its Top 100 Colleges and Universities for Hispanics, and I am pleased that The University of New Mexico has been recognized in several categories--including our ranking in the Top 10 for Architecture and related service degrees. The magazine annually reports on the significant growth of Hispanics in higher education, using U.S. Department of Education data to chart the national progress of Hispanics in higher education and to recognize the institutions that are meeting their needs. I am proud of the work we do at UNM as a Hispanic Serving Institution and that we have had such success cultivating a culture of diversity in which all our students thrive.

10 Digit Dialing Begins Sunday

Say hello to the 505. Ten-digit local dialing, which will require you to dial the 505 area code on campus phones for all local calls, begins on Sunday, October 24. More information is available at FastInfo7885, including detailed information on updating equipment programmed to complete 7-digit dialing, updating auto attendant options and speed dials, and effectively transitioning to 10-digit local dialing. The new local dialing requirement is to accommodate the implementation of the new 988 National Suicide Prevention and

Mental Health Crisis Lifeline. The few seconds it takes to dial the area code could help save someone's life.
