Good afternoon, Lobos -

Last week was a good week for science and a reminder that perseverance can be pivotal in achieving success. Last Thursday, February 18, we watched NASA's Mars rover *Perseverance*—launched during the first months of the global pandemic—touch down on the surface of Mars. *Perseverance* safely made it through what NASA scientists call the "seven minutes of terror," those uncertain minutes when the rover enters the Martian atmosphere completely on autopilot, unreachable until it touches down. And among those who joined in the celebration with NASA's Mission Control were a number of UNM scientists, professors, graduate students, and alumni involved in the mission.

UNM's active group, including Professors Horton Newsom and Louis Scuderi, and Ph.D. students Zach Gallegos, Tim Nagle-McNaughton, and Joshua Williams, have been involved with some of the work on the characterization and selection of the Jezero Crater area, which was likely once a Martian lake, and which served as the landing site of Perseverance. Based partly on their work, NASA determined that this site may be ideal for its search for signs of past life on the red planet.

A number of UNM alums are also highly involved in the mission including Dr. Larry Crumpler, Dr. Amy Williams, Dr. Nina Lanza, Dr. Ann Ollila, Dr. Chris Herd, Roberta Beal, Jade Comellas and Patrick Gasda. Dr. Crumpler, a volcanology and space sciences researcher at New Mexico Museum of Natural History, and Dr. Roger Wiens, a planetary scientist at Los Alamos National Laboratory, are adjunct professors in the Earth and Planetary Sciences Department at UNM.

Among the key contributions to the *Perseverance* mission is the "SuperCam" mounted on the rover, which examines rocks and soil with a camera, laser, and spectrometers. With this technology, it will be possible to identify the chemical and mineral makeup of a sample from more than 20 feet away.

UNM's larger Mars team, including Professor Laura Crossey and many of our Lobo students, are involved in research that will contribute to understanding the history of Mars, with a particular focus on Gale Crater—the landing site of the earlier *Curiosity* mission—as well as Jezero Crater, where *Perseverance* is doing its work.

I'm so proud of and thrilled for our Lobo scientists—truly exemplifying the kind of exciting and innovative research that's possible at New Mexico's only R1 university.

Project ECHO Joins International Consortium to Roll Out COVID-19 Vaccine

Project ECHO, The University of New Mexico's groundbreaking telementoring program, <u>is partnering with a consortium of global health organizations</u> to ensure that all countries receive support in their COVID-19 vaccine rollout efforts. The Spirit of Excellence Award is presented to lawyers whose commitment to racial and ethnic diversity in the legal profession is evident in their workplace and at the national, state, or local level. As a law teacher, Professor Creel introduced her students to federal habeas corpus in the Southwest Indian Law Clinic, arguing and winning habeas cases filed on behalf of Native Americans—but she is perhaps best known for teaching cultural competence and helping students go on to lead fulfilling careers as lawyers who make an impact.
