Last week, I provided you with an update of our progress on <u>UNM 2040: Opportunity Defined</u>, our multi-year plan to shape the future of The University of New Mexico. As I mentioned then, we've reached that critical phase in the project when we get to hear your ideas and aspirations for Lobo life in the year 2040. As this part of the process, we have opened our new IdeaScale-powered <u>UNM innovation management platform</u> as a collaborative space for gathering not only your feedback, but also for engaging with the entire UNM community.

I've been incredibly encouraged by the feedback, suggestions, and ideas we've seen from you so far, which is why I've asked that the initial February 7 deadline for comments be extended to Friday, February 18. The insights we've already received are helping us fine-tune our vision framework and continually revise our plan to be more reflective of the shared concerns of the Lobo community.

If we haven't heard from you already, I encourage all UNM students, faculty, and staff to take a moment to log into our <u>IdeaScale platform</u>--there's no need to create an account; you simply use your current UNM login credentials—and join the conversation. As you explore the page, you may be inspired to provide us with ideas of your own about the future of UNM--or you can upvote or comment on the ideas of others. Either way, you'll be providing us with transparent, real-time feedback on the process. If you have questions or want more information, <u>there will be an informational Zoom session on Thursday, February 10, at noon.</u> You can also <u>provide feedback through the UNM 2040: Opportunity Defined webpage</u>.

Our next step will involve the implementation of *UNM 2040*, where we will work toward the execution of the vision plan, goals, and objectives. It's vital that the plan truly reflects the priorities, dreams, and aspirations of the UNM community, which is why your input is so important to this process. You have until February 18 to <u>log in</u>, look around, and join the conversation—and I can't wait to hear from you.

The upcoming dialogue will showcase the work Dismantling Constructs of Whiteness in Higher Educational Narratives of Resistance from the Academy, in a panel discussion featuring editors Dr. Margie Montañez and Dr. Teresa Y. Neely, and contributors Dr. Eric Castillo, Nikhat Ghouse, and Brandi Wells-Stone, and moderated by Vice President for Equity and Inclusion, Dr. Assata Zerai. This Diversity Dialogue will be held virtually on Wednesday, February 9, from noon to 1:30 p.m.

Associate Provost Honored with Major Literature Prize

Congratulations to Dr. Pamela Cheek, Associate Provost for Student Success and a professor of French and comparative literature, who was recently awarded the 2022 Laura Shannon Prize in Contemporary European Studies by the Nanovic Institute for European Studies at the University of Notre Dame for her book Heroines and Local Girls: The Transnational Emergence of Women's Writing in the Long Eighteenth Century. This prestigious award is presented to a work that transcends a focus on any one country, state, or people to stimulate new ways of thinking about contemporary Europe as a whole. In awarding the prize, the jury hailed Dr. Cheek's work as "geographically and intellectually ambitious" and an "indispensable reference point for writers and readers interested in reception politics, literary history and women's writing." Congratulations on a well-deserved honor, Dr. Cheek – you've made Lobos everywhere proud.

UNM Receives NASA Early-Stage Innovation Research Award

As New Mexico's only R1 institution, our Lobo researchers are always challenging themselves to solve some of the biggest problems on Earth – and beyond. I'm delighted that NASA recently selected the Institute for Space and Nuclear Power Studies at The University of New Mexico to receive its Early Stage Innovation 2021 research award. This three-year, \$650,000 award will be used to develop advanced lightweight heat-rejection radiators for future space nuclear power and propulsion systems – paving the way for future missions to Mars and the moon. Congratulations to our team from the Department of Nuclear Engineering for this award and for their remarkable work.

Alumni Association Seeking Nominees
