Every week seems to bring more news about the amazing accomplishments of our incredible Lobo students and faculty, who make The University of New Mexico such an extraordinary institution. We are proud that UNM remains a place where each of us defines all of us--where we as a pack take considerable pride in celebrating the achievements of our individual Lobos.

To begin with, I was thrilled to learn that **Darcy Barron**, an assistant professor in the Department of Physics and Astronomy, has been <u>presented with a prestigious Cottrell Scholar Award by the Research Corporation</u> <u>for Science Advancement</u>. The Cottrell Scholar Award is presented to teacher-scholars for innovation in their research and their potential for academic leadership; in the case of Dr. Barron, she was <u>cited for her</u> <u>innovative research on new ways of studying our universe</u>. Congratulations, Dr. Barron, on this incredible achievement.

I'm also excited about the most recent accomplishment of History professor **Tiffany Florvil**, who just <u>received the Waterloo Centre for German Studies prize for her research</u>, presented in her book Mobilizing Black Germany: Afro-German Women and the Making of a Transnational Movement. The Waterloo Centre for German Studies supports and promotes research on all aspects of the German-speaking world, and Prize jurors called Mobilizing Black Germany an "immensely important book" that charts new ground in German social history. Among our amazing Lobo students, I'm pleased to recognize **William Crockett**, presently pursuing a double major in Physics & Astronomy and Biology, who has been <u>accepted into the Santa Fe Institute (SFI) summer</u> <u>research program on complex systems science</u>. As part of the ten-week program, William will work with an SFI mentor to develop and carry out an independent research project as preparation for the next step in his academic career, which, he says, includes pursuing his doctorate in computational biology.

And finally, at least for this week, congratulations to the LoboEats team--**Sarita Cargas, Emily Castle, Amiah Dutra, Jane Keth, and Biraj Silwa**--as the winners of the ninth annual Mobile App Contest, which provides students from UNM and Central New Mexico Community College (CNM) with the opportunity to develop and apply coding skills to make useful mobile applications for the community. And I love this: the LoboEats team's winning app connects UNM students with offices that have food left over from catered events, with the dual purpose of preventing food waste and feeding hungry Lobos—the kind of innovative approach to a pressing problem that defines Lobo research and one that creatively merges science and compassion.

As always, I'm impressed by the expertise, enthusiasm, and empathy of our faculty, staff, and students. Your accomplishments are truly inspiring, and our entire pack is proud of you.

Office of International Health Redesignated as WHO Collaborating Center

As the state's only teaching hospital, we proudly embrace our responsibility for protecting public health not just in New Mexico, but across the nation—and around the world. I'm thrilled, then, that the Office of International Health at The University of New Mexico Health Sciences Center (UNM HSC) has recently been <u>redesignated as a collaborating center by the World Health Organization/Pan American Health</u> <u>Organization (WHO/PAHO)</u>. Under this designation, UNM will continue to provide training for universities and health programs in member countries that advance social accountability and interprofessional education, another shining example of UNM's health care professionals doing more and doing good.

Chancellor at UNM-Gallup Stepping Down

Since my arrival at The University of New Mexico, it has been a real pleasure to work with Dr. James Malm, who has served as chancellor of UNM-Gallup since 2017, and who has led our branch campus in western New Mexico with determination and vision. Dr. Malm recently informed us that when his appointed term comes to an end on June 30, 2022, <u>he has opted to step down from his position and return to his first passion</u>—teaching. It's certainly hard to compete with that, but we'll miss him and his steady hand on the wheel in Gallup.

Effective July 1, 2022, Professor Sabrina Ezzell, currently Chair of Education, Health, and Human Services at UNM-Gallup, will assume the role of Interim Chancellor as we begin our search for the next leader of UNM-Gallup. My thanks to Dr. Malm for his service and leadership—and especially for his hard work on behalf of our students.

Artoo, Brute?

As New Mexico's only Research 1 institution, UNM embraces a culture of innovation that thrives on diversity and empowers breakthroughs in some unexpected places. The most recent example of this unconventional thinking comes from one of our research teams at UNM's Smart Management of Infrastructure Laboratory (SMILab), which has created a remote-controlled (RC) robot designed to detect potential rockslide danger. The RC robot, which researchers have dubbed "Brutus," pinpoints damaged and unstable rocks for roadside safety inspectors, keeping humans safely out of harm's way during potentially dangerous inspections, and helping to make roads safer for drivers. Congratulations to SMILab for this innovative — and dare I say fun? — approach to solving an everyday problem.

And as it does regularly at this time of year, the UNM Department of Anthropology is celebrating Women's History Month with a <u>comprehensive website packed full of information and resources about women's</u> <u>history, research, videos, and many other topics,</u> including a synopsis of the history-making scholars at UNM.
