Anderson School of Management & College of Fine Arts Launch MBA in Film & Digital Arts

With the new season of Better Call Saul premiering today, there's no question that film and television production remains one of New Mexico's fastest-growing industries, bringing more than \$600 million to our state annually. I'm excited, then, that UNM's Anderson School of Management has partnered with the UNM Film & Digital Arts Department to provide a new MBA track focused on film and digital arts beginning in August 2022. The MBA for Professionals program also allows early career professionals to pursue tracks in education, health care, finance, and general management. Students admitted to the new film and digital arts track will complete the Anderson MBA for Professionals coursework along with 12 credit hours from the UNM Film & Digital Arts Department. I am delighted to see our programs evolve to meet the interests of our students and needs of our economy, and this MBA program is an exciting addition to our academic offerings.

One of the five goals set forth in <u>UNM 2040: Opportunity Defined</u>, our long-term plan for the future of The University of New Mexico, is a <u>commitment to long-term sustainability</u>--that is, ensuring we have the necessary human, financial, and physical resources necessary for the achievement of our aspirations, while protecting the natural environment. Forensic Psychology Fellowship Goes Global

Going online in the face of COVID had an unexpected impact on the UNM Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences' postdoctoral fellowship in forensic psychology: <u>it went global</u>. The Law and Mental Health Lecture series, launched in 2018 to provide instruction largely to lawyers and psychologists to support

the legal system, has seen its list of attendees for its weekly seminars jump from fewer than 20 per week to nearly 700 participants from around the globe. The lecture series allows participants to earn continuing education credits as well as providing forensic psychologists with the most up-to-date information they need to successfully evaluate criminal defendants' competence to stand trial or to testify in court regarding the effects of mental illness, drugs, alcohol, and post-traumatic stress.

Use of Increased Maximum Annual Leave Extended

With many of you hopefully planning for vacation time this summer, I'm happy to announce that the date to use accrued annual leave exceeding 252 hours has been extended from June 30 to August 31, 2022 for faculty and staff on the central, branch and HSC campuses. Annual leave is a vital benefit for maintaining physical and mental well-being. With the ongoing challenges of the pandemic, both individually and as an institution, taking time to recharge has never been more important, and this extension is intended to give our employees the opportunity to use their well-earned leave during the vacation season. UNM Leadership Updates

Last week, Lobos faculty, staff, and students had the opportunity to meet with the last of our three finalists
for Vice President for Student Affairs, as in-person interviews continued on campus for this vital position.
Also completed this week were interviews for the Chancellor of UNM-Valencia, as we work to have this post ready to fill when Chancellor Alice V. Letteney retires on July 31. The provost will be reviewing the UNM community feedback on the candidates and will provide further information on these searches in the coming weeks.

The national search for a new dean of the School of Engineering is under way. following the announcement that Dean Christos Christodoulou is stepping down to return to teaching and research. Dean Christodoulou has graciously agreed to continue to stay in his role until the new dean begins their term in January 2023. Meanwhile, I am pleased to note that the Provost has appointed Dr. Stephanie McIver, director of Student Health and Counseling (SHAC) Counseling Services, as the interim executive director of SHAC. She succeeds Dr. James Wilterding, who will continue to serve on the SHAC leadership team in the role of co-medical director.
