At our UNM-Los Alamos campus, I am delighted to welcome <u>Dr. Mike Holtzclaw as our latest chancellor</u>, effective July 18, 2022. Dr. Holtzclaw joins us from the College of San Mateo in California, where he serves as vice president of Instruction and acting vice president of Student Services. During our search, Dr. Holtzclaw impressed the committee not only with his expertise and commitment, but also with his infectious enthusiasm for UNM-Los Alamos and the surrounding community.

Lobo Alum Wins Pulitzer Prize for Music

Some incredible news came our way last week when we learned that Albuquerque-based musician and Lobo alum Raven Chacon won the 2022 Pulitzer Prize for Music for his composition *Voiceless Mass*. As a Dine composer, Chacon is the first Indigenous musician, as well as the first New Mexican, to win the Pulitzer Prize for Music. Chacon earned his BA in Fine Arts from UNM in 2001 and has used his unique talents to convey the stories and experiences of Indigenous people through music and composition. The University of New Mexico, our community, and our state celebrate this amazing accomplishment with pride and awe.
