Masks Recommended at Albuquerque, Gallup and Valencia Campuses

UNM-Taos Nurses Post Perfect Pass Rate

Congratulations to our nursing students at UNM-Taos, who just raised the bar on defining Lobo excellence. <u>All 12 of our</u> <u>students in the Associate Degree in Nursing and Bachelor of Science in Nursing programs</u> recently <u>achieved a</u> <u>100 percent first-time pass rate on the National Council Licensure Exam</u>. This perfect pass rate exceeds both the national average pass rate of 82 percent and the state of New Mexico's average pass rate of 83 percent. We're proud to educate and train such highly qualified health care providers, and we are especially grateful that so many of our nursing graduates go on to serve in their local communities where their unique brand of compassionate care is needed and appreciated.

Your Latest Pride Month Reading

As we continue to celebrate Pride Month across our community, I want to call special attention to the work of Assistant Professor **Belinda Deneen Wallace**, whose article <u>"Our Lives: Scribal Activism, Intimacy, and Black Lesbian</u> <u>Visibility in 1980s Canada,"</u> was recently <u>awarded the 2022 Prize for Best Article by the Canadian Committee</u> <u>on the History of Sexuality</u>. Her article, which appeared as part of a series on "Queer Canada," was hailed for "shed[ding] much-needed light on the significant contributions of Black lesbian creativity, visibility, and community." UNM Physical Therapy Unveils Women's Health Residency Program

When you've got hip pain, the last thing you need is to be on a long waiting list to see a good physical therapist. Thanks to a new residency program announced by The University of New Mexico Division of Physical Therapy, more help is on the way. The newly created UNM Women's Health Physical Therapy Residency Program will help feed the pipeline of much-needed physical therapists specializing in women's and pelvic health. This 12-month residential program will concentrate not only on treating patients with pelvic floor dysfunction and obstetrical health care needs, but also on other aspects of women's health, such as the psychology and sociology of gender health. In this way, UNM Health Sciences Center continues its proud tradition of truly delivering more.

Lobo Student-Athletes Score in the Classroom

For our student-athletes, Lobo pride doesn't just translate into success in their sport; it also means excellence in the classroom. For the 28th straight semester, our Lobo athletes have accumulated a grade point average of 3.0 or higher, recording a 3.33 GPA for Spring 2022, the fifth-best in department history. This past semester also saw 71 athletes attain a GPA of 4.0 or higher and marked a program-best for the women's volleyball team, which achieved a teamwide GPA of 3.81. Among all programs, the women's golf team turned in the best GPA for the semester at 3.98, the seventh straight semester with a 3.9 or better. I am also pleased that, for the 12th year in a row, <u>every UNM sport has</u> passed the NCAA Academic Progress Rate, which looks at both eligibility and retention. I'm proud of everything our student-athletes have achieved this season, and I appreciate the support of the coaches, trainers, mentors, teachers and everyone who helps them succeed inside the classroom--and beyond.

Witkiewitz Named Director of CASAA

At UNM, we're proud to offer a wide range of <u>comprehensive health resources and support services</u>, including those available from our multidisciplinary research center, the <u>Center on Alcohol</u>, <u>Substance Use</u>, <u>and</u> <u>Addictions</u> (CASAA). The caliber of assistance we provide through these programs is due in no small part to the quality of the leaders we have at the head of them—and I am delighted to announce that we have recently <u>selected Professor</u> <u>Katie Witkiewitz</u> as our newest CASAA director</u>. Professor Witkiewitz is a longtime Lobo who presently serves as a professor of psychology, with a joint appointment at CASAA, and was selected as one of our distinguished Regents' professors in 2018. She begins her service as director on July 1, following the retirement of current director J. Scott Tonigan. My thanks to Professor Tonigan for his service, and I am pleased to welcome Professor Witkiewitz to her new role in the university community.
