Starting this fall, one of the balloons you'll see overhead will be <u>UNM's official hot air balloon, Cherry on Top, which made its first public appearance this morning</u> on Johnson Field in front of more than 250 Lobos. While the wind made it impossible for our students to take the tethered balloon rides we'd hoped for, it was still exciting to see our balloon fill with the heat from its propane burners and slowly rise up against a beautiful New Mexico sunrise.

Cherry on Top will be one of the more than 500 balloons taking part in this year's <u>Albuquerque</u> <u>International Balloon Fiesta</u> from October 7-15, and will be featured at the <u>Diner en Rouge</u>: Sip and <u>Savor</u> event on October 19, as part of this year's <u>UNM Homecoming Week</u>.
