UNM Athletics Offers Free CPR Training

Sometimes, an hour of your time can save someone's life; that's how long it takes to learn about and be trained in administering cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR). <u>UNM Athletics is proud to co-host three hour-long CPR training sessions</u> on Saturday, April 15, between 9 a.m. and noon at University Stadium. These sessions are free and open to the public, but space is limited so you are encouraged to <u>pre-register</u>. Register in advance and you'll receive two complimentary tickets to the Lobo Football home opener on September 9; once you complete the training, you can also show your CPR completion card for free admission to the Lobo Softball game later that afternoon at the Lobo Softball Field. Getting trained only takes an hour—and someone's life may depend on it.

April is Sexual Assault Awareness Month

One of the best ways we can increase awareness of sexual assault on our campus is by coming together as a community. April is Sexual Assault Awareness Month (SAAM), and centers across The University of New Mexico are joining together to support this year's national theme, "Drawing Connections: Prevention Demands Equity."
