Lobo Track & Field, Golfers Shine in Post-Season

Although the Spring semester officially concluded in mid-May, several of our Lobo student-athletes continued to compete in post-season play late into May and on into June. At last weekend's NCAA West Preliminary Championship, 12 Lobo athletes from our Track & Field team qualified for 15 berths across eight events in the upcoming NCAA Track & Field Championships. This is the first time since 1965 that UNM has had 15 separate national qualifiers—an exciting accomplishment for head coach Joe Franklin and the entire Lobo Track & Field team. Our qualifying student-athletes will compete at the NCAA National Championships starting this Wednesday in Austin, Texas, and we can't wait to see the outcome.

Our golf teams also wrapped up their seasons with distinction, with the women's team finishing its run through the 2023 NCAA Women's Golf Championship <u>tied for ninth place</u>, earning the program's first top-

10 finish in 25 years. The men's team also turned in its strongest showing at the NCAA Championships in a decade by <u>finishing tied for 25th</u>, with junior Matthew Watkins <u>finishing in 28th place as an individual</u>. Congratulations to women's coach Jill Trujillo and men's coach Glen Millican and their spirited teams of golfers; it has been a joy to watch you compete this season.

Finalists Announced for VPHR; McIver Appointed Executive Director of SHAC

Three finalists for the position of Vice President for Human Resources & Chief Human Resources Officer have been <u>announced and invited to visit our campus</u>, <u>beginning next Monday</u>, <u>June 12</u>. The three finalists are Carleen Thompson, Jay Stephens, and Kevin Stevenson. Finalist interviews will include open forums and meetings for each candidate with campus administrators, faculty, and staff. Open forums will have Zoom accessibility and feedback surveys for each candidate will also be available.

Within Student Affairs, Vice President Eric Scott recently announced the appointment of <u>Stephanie McIver</u> as the executive director of <u>Student Health and Counseling (SHAC)</u>. Dr. McIver presently serves as SHAC's interim director and will begin in her permanent position on July 1, 2023. Working in tandem with Dr. Eric Scott, and with support from the newly formed SHAC oversight committee, McIver will lead an integrated, multidisciplinary team of mental health providers, medical professionals, and support staff in overseeing and administering the delivery of campus-based community health services. My congratulations to Dr. McIver; it's a privilege to continue working with you in this role.
