September 15 marks the anniversary of independence for the Latin American countries of Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, and Nicaragua, while Mexico and Chile celebrate their independence on September 16 and September 18, respectively. Over the next 30 days, then, we as a nation pay tribute to and honor the cultures and contributions of Hispanics and Latin Americans.

As Lobos, we honor our Hispanic heritage every day and celebrate it as a rich and vibrant part of our institutional and cultural DNA. At UNM, we're proud to be classified as a <u>Hispanic Serving Institution</u>, and even prouder that our nationally recognized <u>Chicana and Chicano Studies Department</u>continues to explore and examine our state and nation's Hispanic heritage, while recognizing and making new contributions to Hispanic history, arts and culture, scholarship, health and countless other areas.

We are also very fortunate that our campus community has been served for more than 50 years by <u>El Centro</u> de la Raza, our resource center for Hispanic and Latino identifying students. <u>El Centro</u> provides our students with the support, services, and the specialized sense of community needed to ensure their academic, cultural, and professional success. This support includes programs like the <u>El Puente Research Fellowship</u>, which provides opportunities for predominantly first-generation, low-income students of color to work with mentors and faculty in preparation for graduate research work, and the <u>Student Leadership Academy</u>, which prepares students to lead the daily operations and activities of El Centro.

El Centro will be <u>cohosting a wide variety of events</u> with various campus partners for Hispanic Heritage Month, from courtyard coffees to gatherings of car clubs; events may be added regularly as the monthlong celebration continues, so be sure to <u>check regularly for updates</u>. I truly hope you will take some time over the next 30 days to explore and appreciate the history that has shaped us, our community, and our university.

Forensic Psychology Students Go to Court

Students in UNM's newly created <u>Division of Forensic Psychology are gaining valuable courtroom</u> <u>experience</u> and learning from actual crime through participation in a new mock trial program, created in collaboration with the UNM School of Law and members of the local legal community. By pairing psychology students with practicing attorneys, students learn how to construct psychological profiles of real defendants, testify on the stand as expert witnesses in a courtroom setting, and cross-examine witnesses—all in preparation for careers in a wide range of disciplines, from psychiatry to toxicology to criminal law. This is an exciting new initiative from UNM's Division of Forensic Psychology, housed within the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences, to apply theory to practice and develop standards to promote the highest levels of ethics and integrity.
