Last Friday, our campus was a playground for the first amendment. I am grateful that while many made their voices heard, we were able to provide a safe environment; many thanks to our students, faculty, staff and community members for their dedication to upholding our institutional and constitutional values. We will continue in that dedication and will now focus on how to deal with the concerns raised by the executive order of the president of the United States that impacts visa holders of citizens of seven countries.

Our <u>Global Education Office</u> has already communicated with the more than 100 individuals in the UNM community who are potentially affected (whether they are currently at UNM or out of the country), and are <u>advising and supporting them</u>. UNM, like every higher education institution in the United States actively recruits and attracts academic talent from around the globe, for the benefit of our State and the Nation. We are working closely with and supporting actions by <u>legislators and organizations to make sure these efforts</u> are not curtailed.

We do recognize the importance of actions that ensure the visa system prevents entry to anyone who wishes to harm citizens and residents of the United States. At the same time, <u>UNM continues to work within the law to support and protect</u> all of our students, faculty, and staff who might be adversely affected. I remind you that our first amendment right is one of the protections afforded to us by the US constitution. It allows us to speak truth to power on behalf of those who cannot!
