While serving as your provost, I often wrote to you about the challenges universities are facing and always tried to bring the conversation back to the fundamental question: what are universities for? This seems to be the most basic question we must answer as we discuss our financial situation, and our rights and duties as citizens of the United States and the world. I have collected various articles on the subject as we grapple with this question in the hope that we can engage in this discussion at UNM and beyond.

Without advocating a specific position, I ask that you read some of the following (contradictory) articles, while keeping in mind the following:

"Although these incidents may differ by target, type of attack, location, and scale, they are part of a single global phenomenon of increasing attacks on higher education, a crisis marked by widespread violence and coercion to silence inquiry and discourse. Responsible states, higher education leaders, and civil society are called to respond to this crisis — to reject the use of violence to restrict peaceful expression, and to reaffirm publicly their support for the principle that critical discourse is not disloyalty, that ideas are not crimes."
