PRESIDENT'S WEEKLY PERSPECTIVE

Good morning and welcome back from what I hope was an enjoyable spring break.

The U.S. President released his "<u>skinny budget</u>" also known as the "Blueprint Budget" this past Thursday, so-called because this budget submission contains top-line numbers with little program-level detail. As you know, Congress authorizes and appropriates, and is responsible for developing a Congressional budget that sets parameters for annual appropriation bills. The President's document has been given a lukewarm reception at best from Capitol Hill Republicans and an all-out rebuke from Democrats. Indeed, although this proposal is only the first step in the annual appropriation process, it raises the possibility of cuts that could impact many programs at UNM and in our state and nation. As an FYI, attached is an overview of the President's fiscal year (FY) 2018 "<u>skinny budget</u>" released by the Administration.

I'd like to outline the actual federal budget process that starts out in the House. Once the House members have developed a budget proposal for fiscal year 2018, it's sent over to the Senate. The Senate modifies it and negotiations proceed until the budget is approved by both the House and Senate. This is strictly a Congressional process--the President does not approve the Congressional budget. The Congressional budget sets top line numbers, then the appropriations subcommittees are responsible for distributing dollars annually based on those top line numbers. The House and Senate Appropriations Committees will soon begin their budget oversight hearings.

We continue to see public opposition to the President's initial proposals by various House and Senate Members. Of particular concern to UNM is the administration's proposed zeroing of the budgets of the National Endowment of the Arts and the National Endowment of the Humanities, as well as large cuts to the National Institutes of Health and other research programs. Universities and higher education organizations such as <u>APLU</u>, <u>AAAS</u>, and advocates such as the <u>NHA</u> have already started providing feedback to members of congress regarding the President's budget and its effects on education and research funding across the arts, humanities, and the sciences.

I know many of you are very concerned about the executive budget blueprint. Faculty, students, and staff may share their concerns and provide input through Connie Beimer, director of UNM's Office of Government Relations or call 277-1670. As the congressional budgeting process matures, we will continue to assemble analysis on impacts to UNM for communication and coordination with our federal delegation, appropriate Congressional committees, and the relevant professional associations.
