11. Units with deficit balances and associated deficit reduction plans:

The attached report (page 2-3) describes Academic Affairs' FY18 Categorization of Reserves and details major deficits and reduction plans currently within Academic Affairs. Other minor deficits have been identified and will be managed by reducing current year operating budgets.

In the current fiscal year (FY18), Academic Affairs carried forward a reserve balance of \$54,549,678 for all unrestricted funds. Overall, the net change from FY17 to FY18 was a (\$5,204,482) decrease, which amounts to an 8.7% decrease in reserves. This decrease was primarily due to the use of reserves in the following funds:

- **I&G** (\$2,492,273): Many of the academic units decreased reserves, with the College of Arts and Sciences having the largest decrease of \$1.5M and the Provost Units decreased by \$887.5K which was due to the distribution of the equity funding received in FY16, however not distributed until FY17. Additional positive reserves came from the College of Education and Extended Learning. A majority of the decrease in reserves was used to bridge the additional mid-year rescission in FY17, which amounted to \$1.3M. The total rescission for FY17 amounted to \$5.3M.
- Research \$660,528: The increase in reserves is primarily due to the increase in F&A for FY17, which amounted to approximately \$1M. The majority of the F&A distribution went to the College of Arts and Sciences and School of Engineering.
- **Public Service** (\$1,048,437): The decrease in reserves was primarily due to the UNM Press deficit increasing by \$722K and the FY17 pullback of reserves for the mid-year rescission in public service units by \$710K.
- Student, Social, and Cultural, and Other (\$187,286): The decrease in reserves was due to the pullback of reserves for the mid-year rescission.
- **Student Aid (\$1,846,866):** The decrease in reserves was due to Enrollment Management use of reserves for scholarships by \$2.2M.
- Other (\$290,148): Other includes auxiliaries and internal services. The reduction in reserves was due to the pullback of reserves for the mid-year rescission.



Deficits-

UNM Press: UNM Press increased its deficit by (\$722K), which brings its overall deficit to (\$7,110,832). The current recurring deficit varies from \$500K-\$700K depending on revenues from book sales, however for FY18 the budgeted shortage is \$600K. The Press has made progress reducing the recurring deficit by eliminating 5.25 FTE positions and reducing conference and travel expenses. In addition to the cost reductions, Interim President Abdallah has committed to subsidize the Press by \$350K for FY18. With the cost reductions and the subsidy the goal is to balance the Press's budget for FY18. Currently, there is discussion with the College of University Libraries and Learning Sciences to reorganize the Press under their leadership. This potential restructure could include outsourcing the warehouse and fulfillment operations of the Press to an external vendor, which will result in large cost savings. A final determination of the structure and leadership of the Press will be determined later this semester.

We are in the process of developing a realistic deficit reduction plan to address the (\$7.1M) deficit with executive leadership. In the interim, Academic Affairs has committed to pay down the deficit by at least \$70K per year beginning in FY18, until a long-term plan has been established.

Continuing Education: Continuing Education (CE) exceeded its deficit reduction plan by decreasing its deficit by \$370K, which brings its overall deficit down to (\$391,686). CE was able to make larger gains on the reduction of the deficit due to organizational changes to fiscal shared services and gains from state contracts. Given the current departure of the executive director of CE and the reduction of state contracts CE will continue to look for administrative efficiencies, while pursuing revenue opportunities to ultimately eliminate the deficit and become a fully self-staining unit.

UNM West: UNM West has been reorganized to the Health Science Center (HSC) to manage the building, while Academic Affairs manages the course offerings in order to serve the needs of the degree programs offered at UNM West. Due to this reorganization UNM West's deficit has been paid off and has a positive reserve balance of \$97,707, which will be utilized to for the curriculum needs of Academic Affairs to support degree programs offered at UNM West.

Other Deficits: Other minor deficits have been identified and will be managed by reducing current year operating budgets. Units with deficits that have exceeded \$10K and cannot be managed by reducing



current year operating budgets have also been identified and will have a realistic deficit reduction plan in place if one has not already been established.


Committed, Dedicated, and Discretionary Reserves-

Below are the details of how the units categorized their reserves for FY18 according to policy UAP 7000, section 2. Of the \$54.5M unrestricted reserves, \$42.6M has been categorized as committed and \$7M as dedicated, leaving a net discretionary reserve of \$4.9M, which is approximately 9% of total unrestricted reserves.

Committed: A majority of reserve balances are categorized as commitments, which amounts to 78% of the Academic Affairs reserve balances. These commitments consist of donor-designated funds in endowments and gift accounts; special dedicated state appropriations; faculty startup packages and bridge funding not yet spent; legally promised cost shares for contracts/grants; committed professional service



contracts and purchasing orders; funding set aside for student/course fees and funding set aside for future student scholarships and financial aid.

Dedicated: Reserve balances categorized as dedicated amounts to 13% of the Academic Affairs reserve balances, which include funding set aside for academic initiatives, funding for deficit reduction plans, equipment, and operating expenses.


Plant Fund Reserves-

The categorization of reserves system only categorizes unrestricted reserves, however this year we reviewed and categorized plant fund reserves. In Academic Affairs reserve balances amounted to approximately \$6.4M, of this total \$3.4M are committed and \$1.9M dedicated leaving a discretionary reserve of about \$1M. The commitments and dedications will primarily be used for capital projects, equipment renewals and replacements, and lab renovations.




Reserve Trends-

Academic Affairs reserve balances continue to decline, as noted in the chart below. Since FY14 unrestricted reserve balances have declined by approximately \$21.2M, which is a 28% decrease in reserves. Over the last four fiscal years the average decline in reserves amounts to about \$5.3M per year.



Academic Affairs I&G reserve balances also continue to decline, as noted in the chart below. Since FY14 I&G reserve balances have declined by approximately \$9.2M, which is a 41% decrease in reserves. Over the last four fiscal years the average decline in reserves amounts to about \$2.3M per year.






- 1. Total <u>unrestricted discretionary reserves</u> of \$4.9M amounts to 1.6% of the total FY18 unrestricted budget of \$306M.
- 2. Total <u>I&G discretionary reserves</u> of \$5.2M amounts to 2.7% of the total FY18 I&G budget of \$189M (includes I&G allocation, differential tuition, and course fees).
- 3. Total <u>unrestricted reserves (less commitments)</u> of \$11.9M amounts to 3.9% of the total FY18 unrestricted budget of \$306M.
- 4. Total reserves decreased by 8.7% from FY17 to FY18, which amounts to \$5.2M.
- 5. Since FY14 <u>I&G reserves</u> has decreased by 41%, which amounts to \$9.2M.
- 6. Since FY14 total unrestricted reserves has decreased by 28%, which amounts to \$21.2M.
