UNM and MRN Introduce "Brain Safe" Program

Frontline's League of Denial – a documentary on the NFL's concussion crisis – aired this week on our New Mexico PBS, just as UNM introduced a new "Brain Safe" project. In partnership with the Mind Research Network, the project is an innovative, state-of-the-art concussion assessment program designed to student and minimize the impact of brain injury on NCAA athletes in contact sports. Researchers Dr. Kent Kiehl, Dr. Vince Calhoun and Dr. Andy Mayer are collaborating with UNM Athletics on the study, and more than 200 UNM athletes will receive MRI scans of brain structure, chemistry, connectivity and function as part of their physicals. Every year, or after any acute injury, the athlete will be scanned again and the results will be compared to their initial baseline MRI.

This is a topic that is near and dear to me personally, having spent several years running a brain injury program at the University of Missouri. I saw first-hand the life-altering impact that brain trauma can have on an individual and their families.

Although many universities are now doing studies on concussions, the Brain Safe protocol is one of the most advanced and sophisticated approaches in the country, and is an excellent example of the many research programs at UNM on the leading edge of their fields. I would also like to thank Dr. Kiehl for his efforts in publicizing the project, creating opportunities for an even larger impact. For more details, visit Brain Safe project.
