This week, the Global Education Office (GEO) is highlighting the value of international education experiences by encouraging Lobos to study abroad. <u>International Education Week (IEW)</u> events began today with a Study Abroad Fair in the Student Union Building Atrium. GEO provided free passport photos and information on obtaining a passport.

GEO also hosted an International Dessert Competition in the Atrium today, highlighting the talents and cultures of some of our international students on campus. UNM is home to a diverse population of international students and scholars, representing 99 countries, who bring their unique global perspectives into our classrooms. Later in the week, the Geography Department will host GIS Day and author Sherry Mueller will give a presentation on careers in international education.

The IEW events celebrate the diversity of our international students and scholars on campus, and promote cross-cultural understanding and global perspectives on a variety of topics hosted by our academic departments. When it comes to international study programs, students have more than 200 programs to choose from, including several short-term faculty-led programs. GEO and our faculty have made study abroad opportunities more accessible to our students. In the last year alone, study abroad participation increased by 19 percent. Since the 2012/2013 academic year, it has increased by over 55 percent. Congratulations to all of you who have worked to provide these life-changing experiences for our students.
