UNM professor of history, Timothy Graham, has received the <u>2016 Award for</u> <u>Excellence in Teaching</u> by the Medieval Academy of America Committee on Centers and Regional Associations (CARA). This award not only recognizes his dedication to the field, but his ability to motivate his students. He inspires his students to become passionate researchers, and that is what makes him a remarkable instructor.

I would like to congratulate two faculty members who were listed in the Thomson Reuters <u>"Highly Cited Researchers" 2015 list</u>. Vince Calhoun, Distinguished Professor of Electrical and Computer Engineering, has contributed complex data sets, including recent studies with developing adolescent brains. Xuexian Yang, assistant professor of Molecular Genetics and Microbiology, focuses on cells and their function in inflammatory diseases. These honors highlight the quality of our faculty and the research conducted here at UNM.

Every year since 2011, Lobos have traveled to New Orleans, Louisiana for the Alternative Spring Break (ASB) Program. ASB is a chance for students to give back to the greater community by working alongside <u>Camp Restore</u>, an organization that helps rebuild houses for those affected by Hurricane Katrina.
