Creating and Sustaining Social Justice

The UNM Division for Equity and Inclusion will present two workshops today with the Rev. Dr. Jamie Washington, the president and founder of the Washington Consulting Group (WCG), a multicultural organizational development firm, and the president and founder of the Social Justice Training Institute. Dr. Washington was named by the Economist as one of the Top 10 Global Diversity Consultants in the world, he is one of only two from the U.S. He has served as an educator, administrator and consultant in higher education for more than 32 years.

- Faculty Teaching Award recognizes outstanding teaching and service to students.
