For the third year in a row, a UNM alum received the prestigious Guggenheim Fellowship for photography – Janet Pritchard has deep roots in our campus community, including earning two masters here. Darcy Barron, Sakineh Chabi, Elizabeth Korver-Glenn and Hannah Mattson were selected as recipients of the 2019 Women in STEM awards; and their research projects will help shape the future of several competitive federal research grants at UNM in the coming years. Congratulations to the awardees, each of whom encompass our mission of extending research, education and collaboration throughout the state and the country. Additionally, the caliber of UNM research was further enhanced last week as we signed a Cooperative Research and Development Agreement, or CRADA, with Sandia Labs to share knowledge about national security while strengthening science and engineering.
