Cancer Center Scientist Explores Resurgence One Cell at a Time

As a cornerstone of New Mexico's only tier 1 public research (R1) institution, UNM's Health Sciences Center is home not only to compassionate caregivers and remarkable educators, but also to some of the world's most innovative, cutting-edge researchers who are studying problems and asking questions that improve lives. Dr. Sara G.M. Piccirillo, an assistant professor at the UNM Comprehensive Cancer Center, with the help of \$850,000 in grants from the American Association for Cancer Research and the Ben and Catherine Ivy Foundation, is leading a team <u>conducting exciting research in the spread of brain</u> <u>cancer cells, with a focus on residual disease</u>—that is, the cells that are left behind and continue to spread even after surgery and cancer treatment. Notably, Dr. Piccirillo is using new technologies at UNM that allow her to dissect tumors at the single-cell level, allowing for more precise cellular analysis. This is a potentially groundbreaking study in the treatment of brain cancer, and it is only the beginning for Dr. Piccirillo and her team.

Exercise Physiology Lab Helps Prepare Lobo Athlete for Summer Olympics

Given our altitude and great weather, gifted athletes from all over the world can often be found training at UNM's state-of-the-art athletic facilities. For one athlete, however, Albuquerque's often moderate temperatures and low humidity was the last thing he wanted; instead, former Lobo runner and current Olympic athlete Josh Kerr wanted a place where he could prepare for the often brutal and sticky weather conditions in Tokyo, and <u>our Exercise Physiology Lab was happy to help</u>. Utilizing an environmental chamber that has been used in the past to train firefighters and military personnel working in adverse conditions, the lab has been able to simulate the humid conditions under which Kerr will be competing. Kerr is one of <u>ten former and current Lobo athletes and staff who will be</u> representing a variety of nations at the Olympics in Tokyo.
