Eligible faculty and staff may also find similar help available from UNM's Counseling, Assistance & Referral Services (CARS). Additional support, such as our <u>Therapy Assistance Online (TAO) program</u>, access to <u>employee wellness benefits</u>, and other <u>related services</u>, are also available.

UNM School of Architecture Built on Success

The ways in which our physical environment is designed, from its landscape to its buildings, to the preservation of its people's culture, is central to every aspect of our communities. So I'm pleased to share fantastic news out of our nationally ranked School of Architecture & Planning last week, as we saw two of our faculty in the department travel to New York City to receive their prestigious Rome Prize and Italian. Fellowships, presented by the American Academy in Rome. Assistant Professors **Aaron Cayer** and **Cesar Adrian Lopez** were among the honorees for these highly competitive fellowships, which selected winners from 988 entries in 44 states. I am especially proud we can celebrate two winners from our university, which is a rare achievement in this rigorous competition. Congratulations to Professors Cayer and Lopez on your remarkable accomplishments and well-deserved awards.

In other good news, the School of Architecture & Planning recently <u>presented its 2023 Jeff Harnar Awards</u>, which honor the legacy of the late local architect and his groundbreaking work in contemporary design. The program presents several awards for excellence in architecture and design and is open to students and professionals in the Four Corners States---New Mexico, Arizona, Colorado, and Utah—who submit their work for consideration by a rigorous and independent panel of judges from around the country.

This year, New Mexico is proud to have five winners among the prestigious list of honorees. The top prize, for Contemporary Architecture in the Southwest, went to **FORMATIVE architecture PC**, principal architects and UNM alumni **Owen Kramme** and **Stephen Teeters**, for their project USFWS Valle de Oro National Wildlife Refuge Visitor Center. The First Prize Student Award in Architecture was given to UNM student **Thomas Bejcek**, for their project, Silver City Recreation Center, while UNM students Hollis Moore and Lia **Griesser** took home first and second prizes, respectively, in the category of Student Award in Landscape Architecture. Congratulations to our winners; the entire Lobo community is proud of you.

Lobo Tennis Player Named Mountain West Player of the Year

An exciting honor went to Lobo tennis player **Arda Azkara** last week, when the UNM sophomore, who went a perfect 6-0 in Mountain West Play at No. 1 singles, was <u>named the Mountain West Player of the Year</u>. This is the second time the Lobos have collected Player of the Year honors in the last three seasons, and it's the second year in a row that Azkara has received a major recognition from the Mountain West Conference, which named him the Freshman of the Season in 2022. Celebrating AAPI Heritage Month

May is <u>Asian American and Pacific Islander (AAPI) Heritage Month</u>, a time for us to celebrate and pay tribute to the generations of Asian and Pacific Islanders who have enriched America's history and are instrumental in our nation's success.
