Lobo Junior Awarded Udall Scholarship

Last week, we learned the exciting news that <u>University of New Mexico junior Gabrielle Thomas has been</u> <u>awarded the prestigious Udall Scholarship</u>. She joins just 54 other scholars, who were chosen out of 384 nominations from 172 institutions. Udall Scholarships are awarded to students for their passion for leadership and public service and for a commitment to Native American nations or to the environment. Among her many achievements, Gabrielle, a member of the Navajo Nation, is a co-founder of our campus Pre-Physician Assistant Society, and hopes to enroll in Physician Assistant school after graduation. Congratulations on your remarkable achievement, Gabrielle! The entire Lobo community is proud of you.

New ROTC Building Dedicated

Since 1941, The University of New Mexico has been proud to have a <u>Reserve Officers' Training Corps</u> (<u>ROTC</u>) program on our campus. While more than 1,200 colleges across the country have an ROTC program, UNM is among the rare few to house <u>Navy</u>, <u>Army</u>, and <u>Air Force</u> ROTC programs. For decades, however, the three have been based in separate buildings dating back to the 1930s and 1940s, none of which adequately support modern education or training needs. I was delighted this past week, then, to help <u>dedicate a new</u> <u>facility</u> that will house all our ROTC programs under one roof, in a fully renovated and refurbished building that once housed the Alpha Chi Omega sorority. We are thankful for the generosity of New Mexico voters who approved Bond B in 2018 to help fund this project, and I am glad we have been able to provide our ROTC students with a facility that is much more suitable for their needs and duties.

UNM Medical School Ranked Nationally

I am pleased, though not surprised, to learn that our nationally ranked School of Medicine continues to receive well-deserved accolades. *U.S. News & World Report* recently issued its rankings of the nation's best medical schools, and <u>ours was ranked Number 4 in Primary Care</u>, Number 11 in Family Medicine, and Number 2 for most graduates practicing in medically underserved areas, a ranking I know our school will be particularly proud of. UNM also ranked 81 in research, Number 4 in most graduates practicing in primary care

fields and was ranked fourth in the nation on the diversity of its students. Consistent with our UNM 2040 goal to Advance New Mexico, our Lobo doctors and educators continue to contribute to the life, well-being, and vibrancy of our state, and I couldn't be prouder. Congratulations to everyone.
