Good afternoon, Lobos --

Black History Month officially begins on Thursday, February 1, but at The University of New Mexico, the celebration has already started. This past Saturday in the SUB was our 39th annual Black History Month Kickoff Brunch, featuring Lobo alum and Executive Assistant United States Attorney for the District of New Mexico Aja Nicole Brooks as keynote speaker—a great way to start a month of commemoration and remembrance.

When it comes to recognizing the accomplishments of Black Americans and celebrating the Black experience, The University of New Mexico is truly fortunate to find itself guided and inspired by generations of proactive leaders. Six years before the first formal celebration of Black History Month in 1976, UNM had already taken steps to recognize the accomplishments of Black Americans when the collective effort of students from the Black Student Union helped create what was then called the "Afro Studies program," one of the first such programs in the nation. Fifty-four years later, that same program is now our Department of Africana Studies, chaired by Professor Kirsten Buick.

We are also fortunate to have our campus community well-served by our <u>African American Student Services</u> (AASS), <u>under the leadership of Brandi Stone</u>. AASS has planned a <u>month of events</u>, starting on Thursday morning with a flag-raising ceremony in front of Scholes Hall. UNM Health Sciences is also <u>hosting programming for the month</u>.

Black History Month is a regular reminder of our nation's multicultural heritage and history, that the Black experience is the American experience, and that there is unity to be found in our plurality. That unity is worth striving for—but it also takes work. As James Baldwin wrote: "The paradox of education is precisely this—that as one begins to become conscious one begins to examine the society in which he is being educated."

I encourage us all to aspire to meet Baldwin's challenge—not just during Black History Month, but every day. Never stop exploring. Never stop learning. And never stop examining the society around us. There is always so much more to learn and understand.
