NSF Invests \$16M in UNM-Led Climate Resilience Research

Get ready for a more sustainable, equitable, and resilient future: as part of the national effort to build climate resilience capacity, the National Science Foundation (NSF) has awarded nearly \$16 million to three research projects led or supported by The University of New Mexico. The projects aim to build climate resilience capacity—that is, an ability to anticipate, prepare for, and respond to disturbances related to climate—by exploring indoor farming, integrating Indigenous knowledge with Western science, and converting waste into construction materials. Through our collaborative efforts with tribal communities, industry partners, and other institutions, we're poised to drive meaningful change in New Mexico, neighboring states, and regional tribal communities.

Empowering the Next Generation of Space Leaders in New Mexico

University of New Mexico alumna Raven Delfina Otero-Symphony is pioneering a groundbreaking initiative, SCOPE-NM, to make space research accessible to all New Mexicans. This innovative program aims to cultivate a diverse space workforce, promote local space activity, and provide educational resources. Otero-Symphony, a 2022 graduate and a member of UNM's Space Sustainability Research Grand Challenge advisory board, seeks student delegates, mentors, and sponsors to join the movement. Political Science Students Get Personal with Supreme Court History

Students of Lobo Political Science Professor Lawrence Jones recently had a special opportunity to learn about the historic *Kelly v. United States* Supreme Court case by hearing directly from Bridget Kelly herself. During a Zoom call, Kelly—a former Deputy Chief of Staff to then-governor Chris Christie—shared with the class her personal experience and insights into the 2013 'Bridgegate' scandal, in which Governor Christie allegedly closed several lanes at the George Washington Bridge between New York and New Jersey for political revenge. Kelly provided a unique perspective on a case that resulted in her firing and conviction, a decision that was later unanimously reversed and dismissed by the U.S. Supreme Court. My thanks to Professor Jones for so memorably making history come alive.

Look for Lobos in the Summer Olympics

With the Olympics officially underway in Paris, you might want to keep an eye out for seven of our Lobo athletes and staff who are representing various nations in this year's summer games.
