Good afternoon, Lobos-

As The University of New Mexico continues to make major strides both nationally and internationally in advancing quantum information science and technology, it was thrilling to see so many leading researchers and notable New Mexicans turn out for <u>UNM's 2nd Quantum New Mexico Symposium</u>. One after another, speakers and presenters focused on the strengths of New Mexico's quantum programs, pointed to the unique opportunities to build the local quantum economy, and stressed the importance of engaging with leading institutions across the state.

Notably, the symposium celebrated the newly-launched <u>Quantum New Mexico Institute</u>, a joint partnership between UNM and Sandia National Labs—and, very soon, to include Los Alamos National Laboratory. Additionally, there was also the debut of <u>Elevate Quantum</u>, the Mountain West Tech Hub which has received more than \$127 million in public and private funding to advance the United States as a global leader in quantum technology. Other panels featured many of our alumni, discussing quantum education and training, and reflecting on their own experiences as researchers. It was exciting to see so much local innovation and expertise in one place, and I look forward to seeing what advances in quantum research have been made by the time of next year's symposium.

Speaking of advances in quantum research, UNM assistant professor **Milad Marivian** from the School of Engineering is participating in a \$7.5 million U.S. Department of Energy project to research quantum algorithm theory. As a member of the Quantum New Mexico Institute, Professor Marivian will join researchers at Sandia National Laboratories, as well as Caltech, University of Maryland, Los Alamos National Laboratory, Argonne National Laboratory, Lawrence Berkeley National Laboratory, and Oak Ridge National Laboratory to focus on quantum computing research targeting software, control systems and algorithmic advancements. Congratulations to Professor Marivian for being part of this exciting initiative.

Celebrating National Transfer Week with Our New Transfer & Transition Student Center

October 21 to 25 is National Transfer Student Week, which is a time for celebrating transfer students and those who support them on their journeys to attain an education. How fitting, then, that this morning, we cut the ribbon on a new Transfer & Transition Student Center, which serves as a hub for students whose educational pathways brought them to The University of New Mexico from another college or university, another UNM campus, or through our Dual Credit & Concurrent Enrollment Plan.
