Lobo Alum Interviewing for Rhodes Scholarship

Congratulations to recent Lobo graduate Abrianna Morales, who will be interviewed this month as a <u>finalist</u> <u>for the prestigious Rhodes Scholarship</u>. Morales, who graduated <u>summa cum laude</u> in May 2023, was a 2022 Truman Scholar and participated in research through our McNair Scholars Program. Since graduating, she has been working for the National Organization for Victim Advocacy as a program manager overseeing the nationwide Victim Advocacy Corps, a direct reflection of her passions and priorities. She is hoping to be one of the 32 American students selected annually as <u>Rhodes scholars</u>; if selected, she says she'll spend her two years at the University of Oxford studying Political Thought.
