### Hanging of the Greens is This Friday

One of my favorite annual Lobo traditions, the Hanging of the Greens, happens this Friday, December 6. <u>Hanging of the Greens has been a Lobo custom since the 1930s</u> when students would gather greens from the pine forests in the Sandia Mountains and use them to decorate our library and Student Union.

Nine decades later, the Mortar Board Senior Honor Society, working in tandem with many other campus organizations, has turned that tradition into something distinctively special—and it just gets more spectacular each year. This year's celebration begins at 5:45 p.m. just outside the UNM Bookstore, with carolers leading the community in a procession across campus, walking among the more than 13,000 luminarias lighting our buildings and walkways. The procession ends at University House, where I have the honor of receiving the ceremonial wreath before we all gather for a warm reception at Hodgin Hall, including posole and hot chocolate.

The entire Lobo community is invited to attend, and we ask that you consider bringing an unwrapped children's book that will be placed under the tree at Hodgin Hall and then donated to UNM Children's Hospital. Maxwell Museum will also be helping to celebrate the Hanging of the Greens by opening its galleries and its courtyards on Friday from 6 to 8 p.m. Come kick off the holiday season and celebrate one of our proudest and oldest Lobo traditions.

### **UNM Greenhouse Gas Inventory Notes Reduction in Campus-Wide Emissions**

The University of New Mexico has published its first Greenhouse Gas (GHG) Inventory in a decade, marking a key step toward advancing our <u>sustainability goals under the UNM 2040 initiative</u>. The <u>report highlights an 11% reduction in campus-wide emissions since 2006</u>, despite an increase in building square footage, with emissions per square foot down 25%. Led by UNM's newly formed <u>Office of Sustainability</u>, the inventory provides baseline data for climate action and engages the campus community in shaping a five-year sustainability plan. Many thanks to Anne Jakle, our Director of Sustainability, for her leadership on this initiative.

#### Tomorrow is Giving Tuesday; Lobo Offensive Line Leads by Example
