He was also an assistant attorney general for the State of Florida and served as a staff judge advocate attorney for the U.S. Air Force Judge Advocate General's Corps. Jones's extensive background and his proven track record of leadership makes him an ideal fit for our institution, and I am confident that his unique combination of talent and experience will serve UNM well. I appreciate the work of our search committee, led by Regent Bill Payne and UNM Law School Dean Camille Carey, in bringing Jones to our institution, and I look forward to formally welcoming him aboard in February.



Work by Lobo Architecture Professor Featured at MOMA

Some exciting news from the School of Architecture, as UNM Professor of Architecture Chris Cornelius recently had his [groundbreaking work acquired by the Museum of Modern Art](#) (MOMA), where it will be added to the [iconic museum's](#) permanent collection for Architecture and Design. Cornelius, the first Indigenous person trained as an architect to be featured in the MOMA's collection, was honored with the [selection of several drawings from his 2014 Radio Free Alcatraz project, and his model "Bear,"](#) all of which are being featured in the exhibition [Down to Earth](#), which opened in New York in late November. Congratulations to Professor Cornelius—hailed by Robert González, Dean of the UNM School of Architecture and Planning, as “a central voice of a new generation of designers”—for this landmark achievement.
