With the support of \$4 million in funding from the Health Resources and Services Administration's Maternity Care Program and a significant donation from Blue Cross and Blue Shield of New Mexico, our midwifery program is continuing to expand its reach and resources, shaping maternal health care delivery in New Mexico for the better.
