While President Gerald Ford formally recognized Black History Month in the United States in 1976, UNM was well ahead of the national movement—and, in fact, had helped lead the national groundswell that eventually led to the federal designation. In 1970, under the leadership and collective effort of students from the Black Student Union, what was then called the “Afro Studies program” was born, one of the very first programs like it in the nation. Afro Studies would grow and evolve, becoming African American Studies in

1982. Eleven years later, it became a degree-granting program, and today it has full department status as our Department of Africana Studies.

I'm also proud of the dynamic partnership between the Department of Africana Studies, under the leadership of Dr. Kirsten Buick, and our African American Student Services (AASS), led by Brandi Stone. Their close collaboration ensures our students have a meaningful and productive student experience. We continue to grow and learn as a university, and we will continue to look to their leadership—and to our extraordinary Black Lobo community—to help guide and inspire us.

I want to mention one inspiring leader we just recently lost: Dr. Harold Bailey, Albuquerque NAACP President and a long-time Lobo professor, mentor, advocate, and inspiration to several generations of thinkers, activists, and community leaders. Since stepping onto our campus as a track star in the mid-60s, Dr. Bailey spent his life committed to uplifting the Black student experience and ensuring that UNM respected the contributions of the Black community. As we celebrate Black History Month, we celebrate Dr. Bailey's life and memory.

As you reflect and celebrate, AASS has planned a [month of events](#), including a [conversation with poet, activist, and author Kevin Powell called Hip Hop is Resistance: The Future of America](#) on February 27 in the SUB Ballroom. Health Sciences is also [hosting programming this month](#), including a lecture by social psychologist Dr. Robert W. Livingston titled *The Conversation: How Seeking and Speaking the Truth About Racism Can Radically Transform Individuals and Organizations* on February 12 in the Domenici Center Auditorium.

Black history has long been a part of the University of New Mexico's history. Today, as we look at the events in the world around us, we're reminded that our history as a nation is multi-cultural, that the Black experience is the American experience, and that there is unity to be found in our plurality.
